A dedicated Ministry for Disabled People is coming!

The new Ministry for Disabled People's journey begins from 1 July 2022.

So what does this mean for you?



Disabled people deserve better. They deserve a way to engage and shape a better future for themselves. This is the reason for the new Ministry.

The new Ministry will take the lead for disability support services and transforming them so that in the future, disabled people have more control over the services they receive. It will work with disabled people to put an Enabling Good Lives (EGL) approach in place across New Zealand.

The Ministry will lead across government on issues that affect disabled people. Its aim is to drive better outcomes for disabled people.

The Ministry will:

- Lead and coordinate strategic disability policy across government
- Deliver and transform disability support services
- · Work to transform the wider disability system
- Work in partnership with disabled people, tängata whaikaha Māori, families and whānau and Māori.

What is happening now?

There's a team of people called the Establishment Unit, whose job it is to set up the new Ministry.

The Establishment Unit is making sure the new Ministry has what it needs in place when it starts:

- A name and location
- Staff
- Equipment and processes (like finance and communications systems).

The Establishment Unit is also making sure the new Ministry is set up to meet the challenges for the future. This means the Ministry will:

- Listen and respond to the voices of disabled people and their families and whanau
- Work with disabled people as partners
- · Give effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi
- Operate in line with Enabling Good Lives principles.

It will take time for the new Ministry to be fully established. Disabled people will continue to be part of leading and shaping the new Ministry's development.

Here are some key questions:

Will my services change?

Don't worry – if you receive disability support services or funding, they will not be affected. Current disability support services and funding will remain the same during this transition period.

Why isn't the new Ministry rolling out Enabling Good Lives immediately?

There is work to do, building on the information from the current sites, to confirm the Enabling Good Lives model to be rolled out and how that happens in each region. That will be done in partnership with disabled people and family/whānau. Many communities also want time to build their regional leadership so they can better work with the new Ministry on the Enabling Good Lives approach in their region.

Behaviour Support Specialists


Our network of over 170 behaviour specialists are dedicated to working with parents, whânau, caregivers and residential care providers to improve wellbeing and quality of life for all, wherever you live in New Zealand. Our Disability and Autism services are funded by the Ministry of Health.

For parents, caregivers and support workers we provide practical and flexible support to help you develop skills and strategies to manage any situation. If you're currently receiving disability supports you will already be registered with a Needs Assessment Service Coordination (NASC) service. You can talk with your Needs Assessment Service Coordinator about seeking specialist behaviour support from Explore. Find out more about your local NASC here

If you are not eligible for funded specialist behaviour support services have a chat with one of our Specialist Services Managers to find out about our fee for service options.


