Ākonga 8C's

This is a key part of our Local curriculum development. Over the past year we have consulted with whānau and staff to decide what is important for our ākonga to learn so they are well prepared for life beyond school.

This is a visual representation of the 8 priorities identified. The whai (stingray) connects us with our pepeha and environment. The koru in the tail represents growth and our syndicate pathway. The patterns on the wings show our ākonga cultures. The values link into the 8C's and the koru design in the centre values whanau and the school working together to nurture our ākonga, with aroha, and with space to set them on their own journeys.

The next step is to further define the 8C's and the specific skills and understandings our ākonga need to grow in these areas.

We would like to hear ideas from our community and will send out a survey. This started as a 'graduate profile' but we felt that this did not fit our school as our ākonga are so diverse and we want our whai to represent a journey rather than a destination.

If anyone has knowledge or stories about whai in our area we would love to hear them.







Some of room 3 students this term have been lucky enough to take part in the Sailability program. Students travel by school van into Auckland's viaduct harbour on a Friday morning where they have the opportunity to learn to sail under the guidance of a qualified instructor. They learn about water safety, weather and how to use all the ropes, sails and other equipment onboard to sail the small sailboat. The students enjoy sailing around the Auckland harbour and sailing underneath the Harbour Bridge on most occasions. The last trip out the students got to experience a pod of Orca swimming past which got nice and close to the boats for us to look at which was awesome.

For parents, caregivers and support workers we provide practical and flexible support to help you develop skills and strategies to manage any situation. If you're currently receiving disability supports you will already be registered with a Needs Assessment Service Coordination (NASC) service.
